If you see only boxes, instead of graphics, on a page, it means that you have turned off the view of graphics. This feature was used in the “old days” so that we could turn documents in for editing without distracting the text editors with looking at the graphics — and to save the ink required to print those graphics.

The boxes show so that the editors know where the graphics would be. Thus, the editor could ensure that a reference to Figure 1 was in the proximity of Figure 1.

NOTE: Any time a WordPerfect document does not look right, check the view menu.

In **Figure 1**, only the box (the marker to the graphic) is shown because there is no ✓ next to Graphics in the View menu.

In **Figure 2**, the graphic shows because there is a check next to Graphics in that same menu.

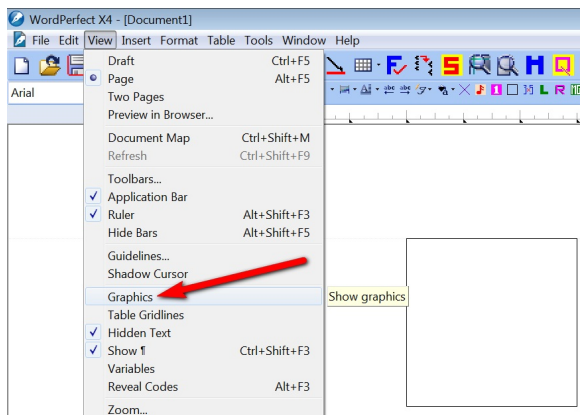

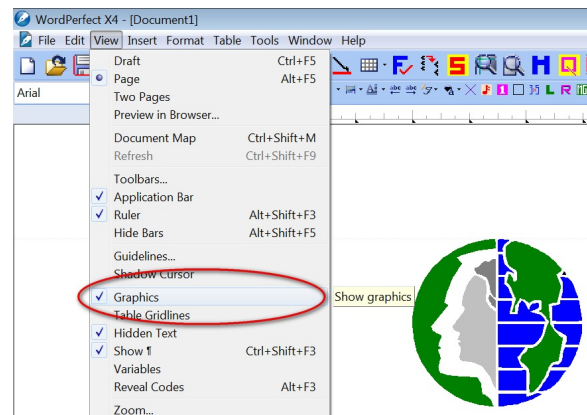
